# *Welcome to God's House today!!!*

## ***Today's Focus - The Reality for the Messiah's Mission Revealed***

They were now going up from Jericho to Jerusalem, going up with Christ to his cross and his death. He went before them, eagerly leading the way for his timid disciples, who were now beginning to realize what was about to happen, and that he would be condemned and crucified. The whole scene is before us. Our blessed Lord, with an awful majesty on his countenance, and eager resolution in his manner, is pressing forwards to his cross. His disciples follow him, amazed and bewildered; The disciples, Bede says that the chief cause of their amazement was their own imminent fear of death. They were amazed that their Master should hasten forward with such alacrity to his cross, and they feared lest they too should have to suffer with Him "***He took again the twelve...***" once more Jesus impressed upon them the dread realities which were awaiting him. They were still slow of apprehension; they required to be told again and again just like we do.

- that Jesus offers us His Body and Blood in a mysterious yet real way;
- that Christ's sacrificial death grants the forgiveness of our sins;
- and that God is strengthening us in this Sacrament to live a more godly; life and to amend with the help of the Holy Spirit, those areas not in conformity with God's will.

We declare these statements because it is our concern for people to not be hypocritical between their faith and celebrate the blessings of God's Table at the Altar. Persons unable to approach the Altar may be communed in the pew, please notify the Pastor or Elder if you wish this service.

## **Fall street sweeping begins October 23 and runs through November 20**

Crews are preparing to sweep streets across Minneapolis to completely clean the streets before winter, and keep leaves and debris out of the storm drains and ending up in our lakes and rivers. On October 23, Minneapolis Public Works will begin a four-week run of curb-to-curb sweeping and leaf collection on 1,000 miles of streets throughout the city. Temporary "No Parking" signs will be posted at least 24 hours in advance. Residents can visit [minneapolismn.gov/streetsweeping](http://minneapolismn.gov/streetsweeping) to find out when the sweepers are coming through their neighborhoods. Street sweeping is explained in English, as part of the City's "Did you know..." series of short videos viewed at [YouTube.com/cityofminneapolis](http://YouTube.com/cityofminneapolis) or on Mpls City TV. Residents who have friends or neighbors who speak these languages are encouraged to share links to the videos.

# **Catechesis Note for the Week**

## **What is Biblical Prophecy?**

Simply put, it is history foretold before it happens. God uses prophecy to REVEAL events to occur in the future and to warn man to repent and change his ways. The Bible is the only book ever written that can demonstrate its supernatural inspiration. Our Creator cannot only predict the future he has the ability to cause his predictions to happen in every detail.

Fulfilled Biblical prophecies are a major proof of God's existence. They attest to his authority and power to influence the course of events on planet earth.

Prophecy constitutes between 1/4 to 1/3 of the Bible. Its importance is constantly downplayed by those who dismiss it as having no practical significance or by those who object to it on the grounds that it is a "fad" that takes people's eyes off Jesus.

The dismissal of Bible prophecy flies in the face of scriptures like Revelation 19:10 which says that " ***the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy***". Thus, if prophecy is properly taught, there is no reason for it to divert anyone's attention away from Jesus. In fact, it should serve to emphasize the centrality of Jesus.

Some people mostly ignore Bible prophecy and miss out on its benefits—the biblical worldview, the motivation and the comfort it can give us. Concerning His prophetic teaching, Jesus said to "take heed." Other people dwell too much on technical aspects of Bible prophecy like trying to figure out exact dates and neglect matters much more important like loving God and loving other people.

When you are reading prophetic sections of the Bible, be sure to meditate on the spiritual lessons that go with it. For example, many people assume that the book of Revelation is all predictions. In actuality, it is full of valuable spiritual teaching.

## **Today's Scripture Readings**

***Isaiah 53:4-12*** This text is the prophet Isaiah's poetic and transcendent sketch of the nameless suffering servant. As Christians we know it is a picture of Jesus where we encounter His essence, His mission, His pain, through this text. Here we know Jesus more deeply and more richly. That said, the suffering servant is not just Jesus; and He is not just for Christians. To the poet Isaiah's credit, the servant has handily and deftly defied all scholarly attempts to say anything definitive about His identity. Isaiah's legendary figure overflows all the boundaries we try to draw around Him and bursts out of all the boxes we try to stuff Him into.

***Hebrews 5:1-10*** This text establishes the basic identity of Jesus as the heavenly high priest, an important and unique contribution Hebrews makes to our understanding of Christ. Christ was first identified as high priest in 2:17, and 4:14-16, presenting the basic idea and implications of Jesus being high priest. But it is not until today's passage that Hebrews begins to really make the case for Jesus being high priest. Our passage has two sections to it: Verses 1-4 give the definition of and criteria for being a priest and verses 5-10 show how Christ meets these criteria.

***Mark 10:32-34*** That centerpiece of the Gospel of Mark is Mark 8:22-10:52. It is framed by two healings of blind men, the only such healings in Mark, and within that frame is a threefold prediction of Jesus' death and resurrection. Our text is the third time Jesus shares this prediction which the disciples in their spiritual blindness are unable to see. The disciples take two steps forward, one step back. The overall picture is depressing, perhaps depressingly familiar.

### **Reformation Sunday - October 28, 2018**

*Revelation 14:6-7; Psalm 46; Romans 3:19-28; Matthew 11:12-19*
