

The Gift of Contentment

As children grow up, they often feel cramped by their parents' restrictions. Dad says to be home by 11. But why can't I say out 'til midnight? Mom says to clean your room on Saturday morning. But I want to sleep in late, then roll out of bed, hop in the car and go to my friend's house without delay. I want to do what I decide is best.

The older we get, and especially when we have kids of our own, we begin to see the truth. Mom and Dad were not cramping our style or trying to crush our personal freedom — they were looking out for us, providing for us and teaching us a better way of life.

If that's how it is with fallible human parents, how much more so with our Heavenly Father! We sinners often feel cramped by the Law of God. Our sinful flesh wants to go its own way, do its own thing and be in charge. But in our heart of hearts, we know how foolish this is. We know that God loves us, and therefore all of His commands are for our benefit. Each one of His commandments is meant to bless us. Consider the last two commandments:

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it. (SC II)

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not entice or force away our neighbor's wife, workers, or animals, or turn them against him, but urge them to stay and do their duty. (SC II)

The commandments against coveting are warning us against losing one of the greatest gifts we can possess: contentment. Being content and thankful with what God has provided for us is a necessary building block of living a happy life. Unthankful coveting of what we have not been given will only make us miserable, so God warns us against it.

God has proven His love for us in sending His only begotten Son to shed His blood for us, cleanse us of our sins and brings us back into His family. If He loves us this much, then when percentage of His commandments do you think are meant to harm us? Probably no more than one or two percent, right? Of course that's absurd. God means to bless us with everything He says to us. The Law of God simply describes what a truly happy life, lived in thankfulness to Christ, looks like: It's a generous, merciful, contented life that uses all of the resources God has given us for His purposes.

The Vine and the Branches

The grape vine is probably one of the most heavily pruned of all plants. It bears more fruit with careful pruning. Although I am certainly no expert as a grower of grapes, I have learned that pruning does indeed help the grape vine to be more productive. Jesus tells us the same thing in the gospel-- (John 15:1-17 ESV - I Am the True Vine - "I am the true . . ." - Bible Gateway). Here, Jesus says, "I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing." He also reminds us that even those branches of his that are bearing fruit, he prunes so that they will become even more productive. So, what does that look like? It looks like cutting back unproductive growth. Pruning can be painful, perhaps for the grape vine, but for our lives also. For our lives, pruning involves things like trials, challenges, failure, and loss. Who wants to go through stuff like this? No one! But our Master Gardener knows that such things can actually be used to make his beloved branches (you and me) become more fruitful and productive.

Sometimes, we try to go through life by relying on ourselves and our own self-sufficiency. In our culture, a high value is placed on not being dependent or reliant on anyone else. But sometimes we have to learn the hard way that this just does not work. Jesus tells us here in John 15 that "apart from me you can do nothing." The branches are nothing if they are not attached to the vine. No grapes will be produced if the branches think they can do it alone. It just doesn't work that way. It's all about abiding in Jesus. That word "abide" is used again and again by Jesus in John 15. It means to remain, to hold onto, to stay connected with. Like the grape vine is connected to the branches, so we are to be connected to Jesus. If we're going to produce fruit in our lives – fruit that's going to last – our lives must be connected to Jesus. So, what are these fruits? Paul the apostle identifies what are called the "fruits of the Spirit" in Galatians, contrasting these with what he calls "works of the flesh." As Paul writes: *Now the works of the flesh are evident: sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, fits of anger, rivalries, dissensions, divisions, envy, drunkenness, orgies, and things like these. I warn you, as I warned you before, that those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law.*

-Galatians 5:19-23

Wherever there is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control, there is the full and abundant life that Jesus came to bring (John 10:10). These are the fruits that the Vine is looking for in his branches; that is, in our lives. And it all flows from that cleansing word that Jesus has already spoken to us (John 15:3), sealed with his own blood that was shed for the forgiveness of our sins.

Recently, I read something that a man named Andrew Murray (1828-1917) wrote more than a century ago. I found this helpful and hope you do as well: "Have you ever noticed the difference in the Christian life between work and fruit? A machine can do work; only life can bear fruit. A law can compel work; only life can spontaneously bring forth fruit. Work implies effort and labor; the essential idea of fruit is, that it is the silent, natural, restful produce of our inner life. The connection between work and fruit is, perhaps, best seen in the expression, "fruitful in every good work" (Col. 1:10). It is only when good works come as the fruit of the indwelling Spirit that they are acceptable to God. Under the compulsion of law and conscience, or the influence of inclination and zeal, men may be most diligent in good works, and yet find that they have but little spiritual result. Their works are man's effort, instead of being the fruit of the Spirit, the restful, natural outcome of the Spirit's operation within us." -taken from For All the Saints: A Prayer Book For and By the Church, Vol. I (New Delhi, NY: American Lutheran Publicity Bureau, 1994; pp. 1082-1083).

As we've come halfway into the year, I pray that the Lord will keep you and strengthen you. Always remember what Jesus says in John 15. It's all about abiding in Him.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC - JUNE 1-30

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) officially began work in the Dominican Republic in 2004. Over the years, a group home was established to care for orphaned children with disabilities; congregations and mission plants were started; and a deaconess-training program was launched. The LCMS seminary in Santiago, Dominican Republic, trains students from around the Latin America region.

Remember God's work in the Dominican Republic as you pray:

1. for the seminary students who will enter the seminary this fall, that they would be able to acquire their student visas and other documentation needed to study in the Dominican Republic.

2. for seminary students and their families, that they would have a smooth transition to life in a new place away from family and friends. Praise God for these dedicated students who are willing to leave home to obtain a solid theological education.

3. that God would grant the seminary students determination and endurance, so that they might be diligent in their studies

and make the most of their education.

4. *for the women studying to be deaconesses,* that the theological coursework and intensive practical experience would form them into capable and effective deaconesses.

5. that God would grant strength to our deaconesses as they support the work of pastors by caring for the poor, the marginalized and the sick.

6. with thanksgiving for all the faithful and generous people who have prayed or given of their time or treasures to make the seminary and mercy center a reality.

7. for the seminary professors, that they would be well-prepared to impart wisdom and knowledge to their students.

8. that the Spanish-language theological library at the seminary would be well used and a blessing to the students and faculty.

9. for the families of the professors, that they would adapt easily and find joy in a new country and culture.

10. for Lutheran congregations in Latin America, that they would be prepared to care for and support their pastors physically, mentally and spiritually.

11. for seminary students who are serving vicarages, that they would learn much from their experience and be better prepared for their future ministry.

12. for all the missionaries and leaders of the Dominican church, that they would discern God's

will so that they can build a firm foundation for the church for generations to come.

13. that God would raise up individuals and congregations to support our LCMS missionaries in the Dominican Republic.

14. that God would supply faithful and capable men and women to serve as missionaries, both in Latin America and around the world.

15. with thanksgiving for faithful men and women who have given up the comforts of home and family to faithfully serve on the mission field.

16. that many in the Dominican Republic would hear God's Word and believe in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Pray that they would attend worship each Sunday to receive the Word and Sacraments.

25. with thanksgiving for Hogares Luteranos El Buen Pastor (Good Shepherd Lutheran Home), which provides a safe and nurturing facility for young people with developmental disabilities.

26. that God would grant patience and endurance for the faithful workers who care for the group home's residents. Praise God that He has used these wonderful young people to teach the Dominican Lutheran church about His love and mercy.

27. with thanksgiving that the residents of Hogares Luteranos El Buen Pastor have become active members of the local Lutheran church, where they are eager to hear God's Word and to serve in any way possible.

28. with thanksgiving for the willingness of faithful and gentle caregivers who serve the residents of Good Shepherd Lutheran Home.
