

From Pastor Matthew's Desk

Giving Thanks in All Circumstances

November is here and that means the Thanksgiving holiday is on the horizon. For some, it's been a great year with good things. But for others, it's been a tough year full of changes and challenges-losing loved ones, health issues, etc. Behind turkey and all the trimmings, someone may hopelessly ask, what is there to be thankful for?

Well, at the close of Paul the apostle's first letter to Christians living in the city of Thessalonica, he wrote these words: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, **give thanks in all circumstances**; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). It's that phrase in **bold** that captures our attention: "give thanks in all circumstances." Huh? What in the world is Paul talking about? How are we supposed to give thanks in all circumstances, especially the circumstances that bring disruption, difficulty, even death?

Note that Paul doesn't say "give thanks <u>for</u> all circumstances," but "give thanks <u>in</u> all circumstances." There is a difference between the two. It goes without saying that our hearts and minds are not moved to give thanks for circumstances that bring trouble, hardship, or heartache. But can we see, even in the midst of these difficult circumstances, blessings that have emerged like fragile seedlings poking up through the rubble and decay? The Lord promises that "all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose" (<u>Romans 8:28</u>). God is more than able to transform trouble, hardship, and heartache into blessing. All of this does not come about naturally, but through faith. It is through the eyes of faith that we are able to see and discern blessings present, even in adversity and sorrow. This is what Paul is talking about when he says, "give thanks in all circumstances."

Will Thanksgiving be different this year? Give thanks in all circumstances. Did the presidential election go as I hoped it would? Give thanks in all circumstances. What do the days ahead hold for us? Give thanks in all circumstances. It is as Paul writes in another passage of Scripture: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6). For the Christian, Thanksgiving is not a one-day event in late November. Rather, it is an on-going, daily offering of ourselves, our time, our possessions – all that we are and have – to the Lord, giving thanks in response to his mercy and grace.

Even if all the material goods we possess (which aren't really ours in the first place – they are just on loan to us from God to manage) were taken away, our relationship with that gracious God remains intact, all through the redeeming life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. So, let us offer thanks and praise to God for the deeper and richer blessings in life that go far beyond material goods. Let us offer thanks and praise to God in all circumstances.

The consequences of shallow thankfulness

Can you imagine a Thanksgiving dinner without turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy and pumpkin pie? I know I can't! To not have these on the menu, or worse, to run out of them with the family around the table, would be a culinary sin of epic proportions. An attempt to serve bratwurst and hamburgers in place of the standard fare would ring hollow and seem totally inappropriate and out of place. It isn't that the food would be bad; brats and burgers are pretty tasty. But not for Thanksgiving — they just don't go together!

This month, as we continue to walk through the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788), we turn our attention to verse three. Here, William Watkins Reid, Sr., the man who penned this text, draws attention to some things that do not go along with faithful, thankful stewardship.

Forgive us, Lord, for selfish thanks and praise ...

We see this often with small children. They greedily snatch the candy out of a grandparent's hand, savagely destroy the wrapper, and attempt to stuff the entire delicacy in their mouth in one bite, only to have a parent say, "Tell grandma thank you." This is followed by the pro forma thanks that is uttered between chocolate chews. It isn't really thankfulness; it is simply checking a box to keep mom or dad off their backs.

We never really outgrow this either. Our shallow thankfulness takes the form of feigned humility when praise is being offered. We are thankful that our admirers noticed and called us out: "Look at me! Aren't I special?" No thought at all is given to the fact that the Lord was the One who gave us the ability and opportunity for accomplishment. Our false blush is really only masking our selfish, credit-seeking gain. Once again, we find ourselves idolatrously thanking ourselves.

For words that speak at variance with deeds ...

What carries more weight: words or action? The steward who gives voice to the Gospel in the Divine Service but then lives like a pagan in the world does great damage, not only to others but to the Gospel itself! This is the consequence of failed stewardship. It is idolatry that separates the steward from the Lord.

Worse yet, it also impacts others negatively. When the failed steward is the reference point outside the Christian community, there are those who want no part of being Christian or following the Christ they claim. We see this play out in the impact of overt political activity among Christians based on governing policy as opposed to fidelity to the Word of God. When our lips and our lives are **out of sync, like what used to happen with old movie projectors, the impact isn't funny** — it obscures the Gospel!

Forgive our thanks for walking pleasant ways unmindful of a broken brother's need ...

Our creature comforts often become an obstacle to faithful stewardship. This is true of both individual and corporate stewardship. Financial stewardship is often limited by our desire to be comfortable and have the latest toys and gadgets. Congregational stewardship is often limited by the desire to focus on what is best for the congregation as opposed to how resources might be best stewarded to reach the community with the Gospel.

When we see someone in need, or broken by the world, we often look at them as freeloaders. We admonish them to get a job. We insist that they learn our language, learn our customs, and make them their own. But this gets in the way of seeing every human being the way that Jesus sees them. Remember, that broken person is one for whom Jesus went to the cross to die and rise. When we are unmindful of these needs, our shallow thankfulness also stands in the way of the Gospel.

This stanza reminds us of the challenge we face. Our hearts are master idol-makers. Our shallow thankfulness threatens our souls and hinders others from seeing Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Stewardship is serious business. It is a task for which we were created. In our sinful failings, we are never relieved of these duties. In our Baptism, we are restored to be stewards of the Gospel. Our faithful stewardship is all about that Gospel.

Forgive us when our thanks are shallow, O Lord! In this month of Thanksgiving, grant us the grace to offer heaping helpings of this stewardship so that others may see Jesus!

Shoeboxes for kids

Operation Christmas Child

The Board of Social Ministries is sponsoring *Operation Christmas Child* again this year. In Christian love and spirit, please consider giving a shoebox to a child overseas who may not otherwise receive a gift this Christmas season.

Here is what you do:

- Find a Shoebox You can use any empty shoebox or shoebox-sized plastic container. Operation Christmas Child also has red and green preprinted boxes that are available. If wrapping your gift, be sure to wrap the box and lid separately so that it can be easily opened without ruining the wrapping. It is preferred that you secure your shoebox gifts with rubber bands vs. tape. This way gifts can be processed more efficiently at their Processing Centers.
- Girl or Boy? Decide whether you will pack a box for a girl or a boy and the age category: Age groups are 2 4, 5 9, 10 14.
- Fill with Gifts Select a medium to large "wow" item such as a soccer ball with a pump or stuffed animal, an outfit of clothing to wear, a small musical instrument (such a harmonica or woodwind recorder) then fill with other fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies.
- Pray Most importantly, pray for the child who will receive your gift. You can also include a personal note and photo. If you choose to enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself, your family, or group and your name and an address, the child may write back.
- Follow your box Labels A donation of \$10 per box is critical to cover shipping and other project
 costs. For easiest processing you can give online using the Follow Your Box feature on the label
 and receive a label to follow Your Box and discover the destination of your shoebox gift. If you
 use a basic label, remember to include \$10 (per box) for shipping (checks make payable
 to <u>Samaritans Purse /Operation Christmas Child.</u>
- Drop-Off Bring your filled shoeboxes to Church until Sunday, November 17, 2024.

Below is a list of items to make it easier for you to purchase items to fill the shoeboxes: Start with a quality "wow" item such as a stuffed animal, soccer ball with pump, or clothing outfit that will capture the child's attention the instant he or she opens the box. Then fill the remainder of the shoebox with other fun toys, hygiene items, and school supplies.

Toys - Play cars/trucks/boats, foam balls, finger puppets, dolls, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, Slinky, Etch-A-Sketch, interactive toys that include push buttons, lights, noise (include extra batteries), plastic tools, plastic dinosaurs.

Personal Care I tems – Comb/hairbrush, toothbrush, washcloth, bar soap (packaged or in a container), adhesive bandages (colorful ones -- do not include liquid antibiotic ointment), reusable plastic containers: cup, water bottle, (consider filling an empty container with non-liquid items such as hair bows, bracelets, markers, sunglasses, or washcloths to maximize the space).

Clothing and Accessories – Shirts and pants, Pillowcase dress (loose-fitting sundress), underwear, shoes and socks, Flip-flops, sunglasses, hat/scarf/mittens, tote bag/purse, hair bows, friendship bracelets (woven with yarn or embroidery thread).

Craft and Activity Items – Pencils/pens, small manual pencil sharpener, colored pencils w/case, Crayons, markers, coloring pads, coloring books, picture book, notebooks, glue stick (do not include liquid glue), small adhesive tape, watercolor set, Playdough (consider adding plastic cookie cutters as non-sharp utensils the child can use with the playdough), stickers, building blocks.

Do Not Include – Candy; toothpaste; gum; used or damaged items; scary or war-related items such as toy guns, knives, or military figures; chocolate or food; seeds; fruit rolls or other fruit snacks; drink mixes (powdered or liquid); liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans.



2024 Collection of Leaves and Bundled Brush

The yard waste collection season goes through the end of November to accommodate late-dropping leaves. Your garbage day in the week of November 25 – 30 will be your last pickup of leaves, brush and other yard trimmings for 2024. There will be no additional service after your last scheduled pickup.

Yard waste must be in compostable bags – paper (Kraft) or compostable plastic – or unbagged in a reusable container 32-38 gallons in size, at least 26 inches high, with sturdy handles. Yard waste is not allowed in City-provided containers. Set all yard waste next to your cart by 6 am on your pickup day.

Leaves > less than 40 pounds

Brush > less than 40 pounds, less than three feet long; branch size less than three inches in diameter, must be bundled with string or twine (NO tape or wire)

Fall Street Sweeping | Mid-October to mid-November

Cars must be moved so crews can clear debris and leaves from the streets. Signs will be posted at least 24 hours before towing begins. Signs will specify the day of the week that parking is banned and read "No Parking 7 am to 4:30 pm."
